< BIO RANT >

During a <u>photography</u> gig in 1989, Adem was first introduced to analogue and digital video art during the production of the ground-breaking Max Q '<u>Monday by Satellite</u>' music video, Directed by <u>Jeff Jaffers</u>.

That cultural and creative impetus saw Adem gravitate further toward [the] cutting edge experimental digital art with a fervour, initially via the legendary <u>Amiga-500</u> computer and analogue video-feedback.

Then expanding the visual repertoire to incorporate lighting and laser; fusing these mediums into dynamic illuminated projection designs in various combinations <u>over the years</u> for the <u>Blast Off, Psy-Harmonics, Every Picture Tells a Story</u> and <u>Earthdance, Pure, Machine</u> dance parties, club nights and raves; and <u>FRL, EGA, Big Day Out, Earthcore, Rainbow Serpent</u> and <u>Renaissance</u> bush-doofs and festivals, as well as internationally for <u>Infinite Frequency</u> (LA), <u>Tsunami</u> (NYC) and <u>Movement</u> (MI) dance parties and festivals.

He has also been invited to exhibit print works in various <u>exhibitions</u>, notably in <u>IDEATION</u> (<u>in-situ</u>) at <u>SLV</u> for <u>White Night</u> in collaboration with <u>Projectionteknik</u>

From the mid to late nineties onward Adem also ventured into <u>commercial-art</u>, beginning as a 3D animator, then specialising in VFX Compositing for TV series, TV adverts and Music Video.

His work embodies and explores esoteric concepts infused within the psychedelic, spiritual, scientific, socio-political and cultural paradigms that the highly influential Cyber and Rave culture had originally embraced, and which are still very relevant today.

In collaboration with <u>Cyber Dada</u> and <u>Don't Shoot the Messenger</u>, Adem was a seminal figure in the creation of the experimental <u>Cyberdelia</u> doco and <u>Cyberthon</u> video-art live-to-air broadcast events held at the RMITV studios, continuing at the TVU's pop-up TV broadcast warehouse during the early to mid-'90s. The complete original mastered recordings have been digitised into the <u>ACMI</u> archives – Adem's key involvement has been portrayed within VICE Magazine's THUMP <u>Rave Days</u> documentary, VICE <u>Creators Project</u> article and the <u>Techno Shuffle</u>, book penned by Paul Fleckney.

Adem currently teaches VJ'ing and Broadcasting at <u>RMIT VE</u>, and continues to experiment within these mediums via periodic <u>live-streams</u>, in collaborations to date with a sushi train of music artists such as <u>Andrew Till</u>, <u>Krusty</u>, <u>Carl Cox</u>, <u>Zen Paradox</u>, <u>Christopher Coe</u>, <u>Xavier Morel</u>, <u>Paul Derons</u>, <u>Gus Till</u>, <u>DJ Uzi and Sharul Ariff</u>.

The shape of sound is the defining and driving factor in the evolution of his craft!
